ChamberQUEER programming is always the result of a bunch of great ideas, lots of experimentation, and the inevitable evolution of one of the great ideas into something that feels right, and that resembles the original idea to some degree, but transcends it. This set came about from an initial idea of Kevin Devine's, to pair arias of Handel with important figures from the history of the AIDS crisis. While that idea could fill a whole concert program easily, we also felt called to expand the story we wanted to tell into the present day, because so many of the urgent issues that our activist ancestors fought for, still apply today: the disproportionate marginalization of Black and trans people and the inequity of the health system come to mind as especially pertinent in 2020 and 2021.
